

1. Nomination:

Your home university must nominate you to PAR University for the Erasmus exchange program.

Nomination Deadlines:

- 1. June 30 for the fall semester
- 2. November 30 for the spring semester

3. Acceptance Leter:

Once accepted, you'll receive an official letter of acceptance.

2. Application Documents:

- 1. Completed application form
- 2. Learning Agreement *
- 3. Copy of your passport or ID
- 4. Health insurance card
- 5. Two passport-size photos

Application Deadlines:

- 6. July 30 for the fall semester
- 7. December 30 for the spring semester

1. University Dormitories (Student Dormitory "Trsat"):

The primary student accommodation is located near the University of Rijeka's campus at Trsat. The dormitory offers affordable housing specifically for students, including international exchange students. Rooms are typically shared (double rooms), though some single rooms may be available. Rent is usually around 200 EUR per student. To book a room, contact Student centre on e — mail address: dom@scri.hr and/or scri.uniri@scri.hr. The rooms are usually given to students on a "first come, first serve" basis.

Renting a shared flat with other students can be a great way to live more independently while splitting costs.. Depending on the location and size of the apartment, rent can vary from 200 to 500 EUR per month (and usually per person). Sharing with roommates can significantly reduce costs.

Things to Consider

- Location: Make sure your accommodation is well-connected to the university or public transport.
- Utilities: Ensure whether the rent includes utilities such as electricity, water, and internet. In some cases, these may be charged separately.







3. Hostels and Short-term Rentals

If you're looking for short-term accommodation while you search for a more permanent place, there are several hostels in Rijeka, offering affordable and comfortable options for students.



4. Homestay with Local Families

For a more immersive cultural experience, some students opt to stay with local Croatian families. This can give you a chance to practice the language, understand local traditions, and feel more connected to the community. Homestay costs can range between 150 to 300 EUR per month, often including meals.

Your first step will be to obtain an OIB (Personal Identification Number). The application is submitted at the tax office; our Erasmus coordinator will guide you through the process. Likewise, you'll need a temporary residence permit. This permit is valid for one year and can be renewed annually if your studies should continue (make sure to apply for renewal at least 60 days before it expires).

EU/EEA Citizens:

You will need:

- •A copy of your ID and health insurance card;
- Personal identification number (OIB);
- Acceptance letter from PAR, specifying the amount of the scholarship you will be receiveing during the mobility period;
- Tenancy agreement, signed by the owner of the apartment and notarized by a notary public;
- •Completed residence registration form and supplementary form (available at the police station or at the International Office).

Non-EU/EEA Citizens:

You will need:

- •A copy of your Passport and health/travel insurance;
- •Personal identification number (OIB);
- *Acceptance letter from PAR, specifying the amount of the scholarship you will be receiveing during the mobility period;
- •Tenancy agreement, signed by the owner of the apartment and notarized by a notary public;
- •Completed residence registration form and supplementary form (available at the police station or at the International Office);
- •Fee: 87,59 EUR;
- •Student visa, if required.

1. Upon returning home after your Erasmus exchange, one of the key tasks is to collect your Transcript of Records. This document lists all the courses you've taken during your stay, along with your grades and ECTS credits. It will be issued by your host university, and you'll need to submit it to your home institution to ensure your study abroad period is recognized.

2. Make sure you fill in the "After Mobility" section of your Learning Agreement, as it's crucial for the proper transfer of credits. Don't forget to complete the EU survey, which is part of the Erasmus process and helps improve the program for future students.

3. Erasmus Post-Depression (EPD)—the bittersweet, unofficial phase of every Erasmus journey, where you return home only to find out that life without weekend getaways, endless parties, and new international friends isn't quite as thrilling. You might catch yourself using random phrases in Croatian that no one around you understands, scrolling through travel pics like they're long-lost love letters, or desperately trying to recreate those international potluck dinners—only to realize your cooking was better when shared with 10 friends from different countries.








1. Pace Yourself: Croatians party late. Don't be surprised if clubs don't fill up until well after midnight, so make sure to reserve some energy for the long haul.

4. Speaking of rakija, no night out in Rijeka is complete without this local *firewater*. Rakija is a strong fruit brandy, and it comes in many flavors—from plum to honey to the infamous "will-this-melt-my-face-off" variety. Be warned: it goes down smooth, but it packs a punch.







"Dir po Starom Gradu (A Stroll through the Old Town) is one of the most popular weekly events in Rijeka, especially among students. Get Around with Autotrolej Bus

- Rijeka's bus network connects the city center, suburbs, and nearby towns like Opatija and Kastav. Key stops include Korzo and Žabica (the main bus station);
- Tickets: You can buy tickets at kiosks, Autotrolej offices, via mobile apps (mTicket), or directly from the driver (a bit more expensive). Tickets must be validated upon entry;

*Prices: Single tickets cost between 2.00 and 5.20 EUR, depending on the zone;

 Schedules: Buses run from around 5:00 AM to midnight (schedules may vary on holidays);












PAR International leadership conference March 21st - 22nd, 2025




PAR SUMMER SCHOOL - Sail & Learn July 7th - 18th, 2025 (5 ECTS)
